

N. Scott Momaday

The Kiowa Tribe mourns the passing of Dr. N. Scott Momaday, one of our most revered and honored citizens, last Wednesday in Santa Fe, New Mexico. As he entered into the presence of his ancestors and relatives, he leaves behind an amazing legacy of storytelling and literature unparalleled within the American Indian community that profoundly resonated the history and experience of our Kiowa people. His journey from the shadow of Rainy Mountain to the heights of literary acclaim brought great pride to our citizens and gave the world a glimpse of the capacity of our [Gáuigú citizens to excel at the highest levels of society. Dr. Momaday was a humble, decent man with a powerful and mellifluous voice that spoke volumes about our collective journey and experience which gave great insight into the Native perspective

and intellectual capacity so often ignored or overlooked. We are thankful that Dau:ki allowed him to serve his purpose with meaning and richness in life. We are thankful that such a man as this represented our community with honor and dignity throughout his life. The following excerpt from one of his speeches reflects the Native perspective he so richly shared with society in general:

Addressing a gathering of American Indian scholars in 1970, Momaday said, "Our very existence consists in our imagination of ourselves." He championed Natives' reverence for nature, writing that "the American Indian has a unique investment in the American landscape." He shared stories told to him by his parents and grandparents. He regarded oral culture as the wellspring of language and storytelling, and dated American culture back not to the early English

settlers, but to ancient times, noting the procession of gods depicted in the rock art at Utah's Barrier Canyon.

"We do not know what they mean, but we know we are involved in their meaning," he wrote in the essay "The Native Voice in American Literature."

"They persist through time in the imagination, and we cannot doubt that they are invested with the very essence of language, the language of story and myth and primal song. They are 2,000 years old, more or less, and they remark as closely as anything can the origin of American literature."

Making history as the first Native American to win the Pulitzer Prize in fiction in 1969 for his book "House Made of Dawn," he inspired other Kiowas and Native Americans across the country to tell their own

BISON FAJITA


You will need:

1/4 cup	Italian dressing, fat-free
1 pound	Bison stew meat
1 large	Green bell pepper, cut into strips
1 large	Red bell pepper, cut into strips
1/2 cup	Onion, cut into strips
4	Whole wheat tortillas
1/2 cup	Salsa (optional)
1/4 cup	Sour cream, low-fat (optional)
1/4 cup	Gucamole (optional)

What to do:

- 1. Add dressing and stew meat to a zip-top bag. Place in fridge to marinate 4 hours or overnight.
- 2. In a large skillet, add marinated bison and cook over medium-high heat until browned, 10-15 minutes.
- 3. Remove bison from pan, set aside. Add bell pepper and onion to skillet and cook on medium-high heat until tender, 5-7 minutes.
- 4. Warm tortillas
- 5. Add about 1/2 cup bison and 1/2 cup veggies to a tortilla. Top with optional garnish and serve warm.



FREE Naloxone Vending Machine!

ANADARKO, Okla. – The first Naloxone vending machine in Caddo County is installed at 125 W Main Anadarko, thanks to the partnership of the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health & Substance Abuse Services (ODMHSAS) and the Kiowa Tribe/ Kiowa Alcohol & Drug Abuse Prevention (KADAP). This is part of the "harm reduction" initiative.

Accidental overdose is now the leading cause of death for people under the age of 50. Caddo County is ranked in the top five of all the Oklahoma counties for unintentional drug overdose deaths and methamphetamine overdoses from 2017-2021. The Naloxone medication is designed to reverse opioid overdose. It binds to the opioid receptors to reverse and block the effects of opioids such as heroin, morphine, oxycodone, and fentanyl. Naloxone can be given a variety of ways, including intranasal spray (through the nose), intramuscular (into the muscles), subcutaneous (under the skin), or an intravenous injection. For Oklahoma the most common type is the intranasal spray, Narcan.

Many people still face discrimination & stigma that impacts their health and well-being in numerous ways, including substance abuse. Local communities spend about \$442 billion every year to treat patients with substance use disorders. According to studies, substance use disorder is a chronic treatable disease that the

individual can recover from. The disorder is resulted from changes in the brain that often leads to compulsive use along with the inability to stop despite the negative effects.

The same studies also helped identify new treatments that address the disease. People can and do recover when resources are easily accessible. The Naloxone vending machine is a big step toward providing treatment and part of KADAP commitment to provide quality care for members of the community.







NALOXONE & FENTANYL TEST STRIP Vending Machines

Naloxone and fentanyl test strips are now available through custom vending machines. Items are available free of charge. Individuals will simply need to make their selection and enter their zip code to receive items.

The 7" touchscreen provides an elegant customer experience with custom product images, and even promotional videos. Vending machines installed for the public require a standard GPCI protection. Most commercial grade three-prong outlets are suitable to power a vending machine. Power consumption tends to run about 31 - 44 kWh/day for the lighting and 3.5 - 4 kWh/day for the

PLEASE NOTE - refrigeration is only required when machines are installed outdoors. Machines should not be installed or displayed in direct sunlight. UV rays will fade the graphics and also degrade the LED screen.

Each vending machine holds 100 naloxone kits and 54 fentanyl test strip packages.

Naloxone, NARCAN® nasal spray, 2 doses per package Fentanyl test strips, 5 per package

Each machine is equipped with cellular connectivity and a secure, 24/7 service and inventory monitoring platform. ODMHSAS will monitor and maintain machines so that it is hassle-free for our program partners.

Sue loved to travel. Her first assignment for the Foreign Service was in Brussels, Belgium where she worked for the Ambassador at the U.S. Embassy. Her Foreign Service assignments also took her to Tel Aviv, Israel; Rome, Italy; Mexico City; Madrid, Spain; Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia; and Saigon, South Vietnam. She retired in 1997 as an Administrative Assistant after 28 years in the Foreign Service. She then moved to Tulsa next door to her sister Marlene - and lived the rest of her life there.

Sue served on the American Baptist Churches Native American Caucus for eight years and was a devoted member of the All Tribes Community Church of Tulsa. She was especially proud that she was ordained as a Minister in 2017. On her father's side she was a direct descendant of Chief Big Bow; Chief Heap of Bears and Chief Feather Lance.
