



The Aunko PahnTodope returns.

The Aunko PahnTodope is finally home after a long pilgrimage; and for Augustine Moore, daughter of Mary Ella Aunko (a.k.a. Ruby Hall-later in life), it is a day full of emotion. "... for me it's like a big hug from her, my mama," she said, "I just want to look at it and think of her."

The return of the PahnTodope and pair of moccasins was possible through the advisement of the Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries, and Museums (ATALM) and the Going Home fund. The safe transfer was part of the closing ceremony of the 2023 ATALM conference this past fall. The Kiowa Tribe received the items from the care of Shana Busyhead Condill, Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians and Executive Director of the Museum of the Cherokee People (MotCP). She said, "We hope this return can be a model to other institutions who all have the opportunity to correct the disrupted journeys many of our objects have experienced."

In 2012 the MotCP received objects that were transferred from another

museum. The Aunko PahnTodope and moccasins remained under the care of MotCP but were never once part of their collection. The mission to return the items back to their origins began with the MotCP Director of the Collection and Exhibitions, Evan Mathis, who contacted Rita Wockmetooah Jimenez (Comanche) who viewed the cradleboard first and connected Mathis with Kelly Banderas (Comanche/Kiowa/Crow) in the Comanche Tribal Historic Preservation Office. Banderas and Tahnee Ahtone Harjo GrowingThunder (Kiowa/ Seminole/Mvskoke) then confirmed that the items are Kiowa.

Kiowa Tribal Historic Preservation Officer, Amanda Hill, received the Aunko PahnTodope and moccasins alongside Anita Onco-Johnson, Kiowa District 5 Legislator; Kiowa Chairman Lawrence SpottedBird; Kiowa Vice-Chairman Jacob Tsotigh; and the Kiowa Black Leggings Warrior Society. The items were announced as a new exhibit during the re-grand opening of the Kiowa Museum and Gift Shop in November.

Once Augustine was notified about the PahnTodope, she gathered her family and made plans to visit the museum. "There are no words to describe how I'm feeling," she said, "...I'm emotional, but I am so happy that I lived long enough to see this here." Augustine continued by sharing her memories of her mother and the Saddle Mountain Indian Baptist Church.

The origin of the Aunko PahnTodope is estimated to be early 1900's, the name inscribed on the back reads Mary Ella Aunko, born in 1906. Mary Aunko's kohn, grandfather, Lucius Aitson, was the first Kiowa minister for the church; John, Mary's father, was the second. Built in 1903, the Saddle Mountain Indian Baptist Church was founded by the Canadian Baptist missionary, Isabel Crawford, and the Kiowa community who built, funded, and established the church. Augustine explained that she has many memories of the church because of her mother's faithful attendance. "Mama raised us in church," she said, "...there was once six of us, now it's only me."

Augustine said that she often visits Saddle Mountain or looks at photographs whenever she feels lonely. Now that her mother's PahnTope is home among its people, Augustine can visit often and be rest assured that her mother's memory will persists.

"This is a momentous occasion for the Kiowa Tribe. When the Red River Casino was built in 2006/2007, the Tribe secured financing coupled with an exorbitant interest rate. For many years, the Casino faithfully repaid that loan but spent millions of dollars in interest payments, barely touching the principal.

When I joined the KCOA board in 2018, I served with then KCOA Chairwoman Susan Dunlap and Vice-Chairman Joe Poe. In 2017, they started the process to refinance the Red River loan in order to secure a lower interest rate and save the Tribe money. We presented our proposition to the KIC, who voted to allow the KCOA to refinance the Red River loan balance with much more agreeable loan terms. The refinance saved the Casino millions of dollars and paved the way for today.

Now, we celebrate the official payoff of the Red River loan! I want to thank our Casino executive team, the Kiowa Executive and Legislative branches, as well as our Kiowa Gaming Commission for the teamwork it took to make this moment possible. The KCOA Board of Directors are poised to face the coming adventures as we look to grow the Casino enterprise with planned developments."

Working together towards accomplishing this goal for the advancement of the Kiowa Tribe is a success the current leadership teams are very proud to be a part of.

In the Fall of 2023, KADAP/TOR did cultural awareness for the University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma. The students learned how and what it means to erect a teepee. The next day, the students learned about the talking circle and the teaching of medicine bags. The USAO President Ms. Kayla Hale was also in attendance to learn the importance of the teepee and how it was constructed. She also stated, "Thank you for bringing this amazing culture to our community". Mr. Martin Flores from the I Am NDN program at the Comanche Nation brought the teepee poles, canopy, and a story to go along with it. We here at KADAP/TOR appreciate our community partnerships such as, USAO, American Indian Student Association, I AM NDN, and NASNTI to bring us together.

A very heartfelt thank you to KADAP and Mr. Flores for coming out to USAO in November for NAHM. The teepee demonstration was a highlight for our entire campus. Students met in the teepee for classes, club meetings, and other campus activities. The medicine bag making class gave our students a chance to learn about traditional Native medicines and how they are used for wellness. We really appreciated how welcoming both events were and hope to partner on more events in the future.

KIOWA TRIBE RECEIVES OPIOID SETTLEMENT


Opioid overdose is a growing problem in the United States that is affecting Indian Country. The current opioid-related overdose death rate is 13.7 deaths per 100,000 exceeding the national rate of 13.1 per 100,000 (https://tribalepicenters.org/ wp-content/uploads/2018/03/AASTECopioids-fact-sheet.pdf). Hundreds of the federally recognized Tribes of the US filed lawsuits, claiming that the manufacturers, distributers, and retailers knew that the Opioids were more addictive than stated. After a long and lengthy litigation that begin in 2017; Judge Dan A. Polster has ruled in the Tribes favor, reaching an agreement with the Tribal Leadership Committee (TLC) to settle negotiations.

The defendants include Purdue Pharma (the manufacturer of OxyContin) and Mallinckrodt PLC (one of the largest manufacturers of generic opioids), both entered bankruptcy as a result of the litigation. The pharmacies and Teva/ Allergan also reached an agreement with the TLC on terms for proposed settlements open to all of the federally recognized Tribes whether or not they filed a lawsuit. Those settlements include three of the largest pharmacies: Walmart, CVS, and Walgreens (pharmacies), several manufacturers, Jassen, Teva, and Allergan; and three pharmaceutical distributors: McKesson, Cardinal Health, and the Amerisource Bergen.

The Tribal Opioid Settlements established the Tribal Abatement Fund Trusts; consisted of the money collected from the thousands of lawsuits that were filed by the Tribes, tribal health organizations, states, cities, counties, hospitals, union trust funds, and individuals against the manufacturers and companies involved in the selling of opioids in the US.

Recently, the Kiowa Alcohol and Drug Abuse Program (KADAP) received payment, \$1,809,499.57, from the Tribal Abatement Fund Trust. Charles Nestell, Director of KADAP, explained plans for a facility and possible 'Healing Center' to offer treatment and other potential programs that work in and around addiction and mental health. Other potential plans for the funds includes the following outline: A. Treat Opioid Use Disorder, B. Support People in Treatment & Recovery, C. Connection People Who Need Help To The Help They Need (Connections to Care), D. Address The Needs Of Criminal Justice Involved Persons, C. Address The Needs Of Pregnant or Parenting Women & Their Families, Including Babies with Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome, E. Prevent Over Prescribing & Ensure Appropriate Prescribing & Dispensing of Opioids, F. Prevent Misuse of Opioids, G. Prevent Overdose Deaths & Other Harms (Harm Reduction), H. First Responders, Leadership, Planning & Coordination, I. Training, and J. Research.

Each of the 574 federally recognized Tribes in the US has its own cultures, history, and traditional practices. Therefore, each Tribe is best suited to determine the most effective abatement strategies for the specific community it serves. Nestell stated that the KADAP program will be planning more community outreach that includes Talk Circles, AA Meetings, and other scheduled events in the near future.

Freddie's earliest and fondest memories as a boy and young man were in the Kiowa Gourd Clan arena, where he later became a loyal member and advisor. Throughout his life, Freddie traveled extensively across the United States and Canada. While making his footprints across Indian country, he formed numerous lifelong kinships, of which he always revered. In the southern style, Freddie was a world champion singer with his family drum group, Cozad. As a true Kiowa, Freddie's favorite past time was playing handgame. He was a proud captain of the Camp 7 handgame team, whom he considers his family. The most recent highlight of his handgame experience, was receiving "Best Singing Team" while representing the Kiowa Tribe at the 2022 Crow Nation Sr. Handgames im Crow Agency, Montana.
