This year the Disbursements were held in three locations; Tulsa, Oklahoma City, and Carnegie. The lines were long but the process was steady as Tribal Citizens patiently waited to give their information and receive payment.

The employee staff was easily outnumbered by the hundreds at every event, yet they endured the cold temperatures and supported each other as they assisted every Kiowa Citizen one by one. The smiles and appreciation expressed is made their effort worth it. The acknowledgement that they are able to assist their Kiowa people in such a way during the holidays was the greatest motivation.



Harriet Sloan, "Thank you Kiowa Employees for your help attending to the Kiowa people in the cold elements. Blessings to each and everyone of you this Holiday Season." Another Tribal Citizen, Wynema Lozania, expressed her gratitude. She said, "Thank you Kiowa Tribe and to all who worked in the cold and helped passing out checks. Me and my brother went on Wednesday and got in line at 7:30 AM, we were out of there within 30 minutes. I thought it

was well organized and went fast and smoothly."

Payments for the Kiowa Citizens that live outside of Oklahoma, Kiowa District 7, were sent by mail prior to the disbursement events. Others who live in Oklahoma but didn't attend may expect his, or hers, to be delivered by mail. Introducing Lily Painter, 2022-2023 Miss Indian Oklahoma



Lily's Kiowa name is P'aw Gya Toeñ Ahñ, which means "Brings the Water." She is the daughter of Julia 'Ay Kee Mah' (Noel) and George Allen Woodard; grandparents are Gloria and the late Milton "Bubba" Noel. Lineage includes the Quoetone, Toyebo, Toppah/Yellowhair, Kauahquo, and Lonewolf families.

She received her crown and title at the 2022 Miss Indian Oklahoma Pageant held at the First American Museum on November 12, 2022. Ms. Painter's talent included the singing of a rabbit song in memory of her grandfather, who served as 'grandpa rabbit' for years.

Representing the 39 sovereign tribes within the state of Oklahoma, Lily has begun her ambassadorship by attending the White House Youth Forum held in Washington D.C. She was one out of twenty of the youth from across the nation that was invited. This event was especially important for the youth because it gave them an opportunity to witness democracy, make connections, and the chance for their voice to be heard.

First lady, Jill Biden, sent an invitation to Ms. Painter to attend the Tribal Nations Summit at the White House. This event was the first of its kind and part of the Native American Heritage Month Celebration. Ms. Painter said, "...I am so grateful for this experience, for the people I've met, reconnected with, and for the future we all are building for ourselves and those to come."

Among the Tribal Leaders that attended the Tribal Nations Summit was Kiowa Chairman, Lawrence SpottedBird. He said, "We are so very


proud to have a remarkable young Kiowa woman representing us in such a way. Best wishes as she travels throughout Indian Country..." Chairman SpottedBird continued by expressing that Ms. Painter has an awesome responsibility representing all our Tribal Citizens from Oklahoma.

Ms. Painter is from Anadarko, pursuing a degree at the University of Oklahoma. She expressed the following:

Kee-Dah-Owñ! Lily Aliesse Painter ah kauñ, kgoiye yaw-kgoiye ah daw. P'aw Gya Toeñ Ahñ, ah kgoiye kauñ. Quoetone gaw Toyebo gaw Toppah/Yellowhair gaw Kauahquo gaw Lonewolf, tdape kgope nay daw. University of Oklahoma kgya, ah kgoot ahñ gya. Anadarko kgyah, ah kgeele. Greetings! It's a great day! My name is Lily Aliesse Painter. I am a Kiowa young woman and in my Kiowa language, my name means "Brings the Water." I am from the Quoetone, Toyebo, Toppah/ Yellowhair, Kauahquo and Lonewolf families. I currently attend the University of Oklahoma. I reside in Anadarko.

I am thankful to Daw K'ee for making me an Indigenous person, but especially a Kiowa. I was selected as the 2023 Miss Indian Oklahoma on November 12th, and I will uphold our Kiowa people, our ancestors, elders, teachers, and mentors, as well as all of the sovereign tribal nations in our state and across Indian Country with my utmost ability.

Haunday owñ day, baht aum gya! How wonderful it is we have our ways! Oh-bah-ah.

The government of the tribe shall not make or enforce any law which prohibits the freedom of speech, expression, or of the press, or the right of the People peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for redress of grievance.

A Letter from the KIC Coordinator, Kristi Wolf Norris

Hello to all family and friends in the Kiowa Tribe,

I pray this letter finds you all in good health and spirits. I wanted to take a few minutes to share with you all the things that I have been doing, working on and where I have been traveling to. The hope is to have a monthly newsletter bringing insight and information. There are rumors and misinformation in many areas, my hope is to keep the Kiowa Indian Council (KIC) informed. It is a responsibility that I take very seriously since elected in April 2022.

Since April, I've met with Kiowa Districts 1, 4, 5, & 6, legislators at their offices to listen to their concerns, frustrations, and vision for their respective districts. I attended their meetings and got to meet several members of the KIC. All were nice and open talking with me and sharing their concerns. I took several notes and promised to take these concerns to the Executives when I meet with them. All their concerns are valid.

I often asked three questions when I meet a legislator: (1.) How do you communicate with your district? (2.) What is your greatest need in your district? (3.) How can I help you? According to the legislators, communication is a challenge, in particular with participation for events and keeping up to date with address change.

I was invited to Kiowa Districts 1, 4, & 6, meetings in April to introduce myself and listen to the concerns of the KIC. I also traveled with information and applications that I was able to make copies of. I am often invited to District 1 each month to participate and be part of Bingo night as the 'caller'. It is always fun and we enjoy good meals along with fellowship, plus there's activities and raffles. I like the opportunity to be a part and share the things that I've been doing and working on. District 1 keeps me informed and kept me up to date about the petition to call a Special Meeting to discuss Blood Quantum. I participated in collecting signatures while traveling to various events and the Kiowa districts.

In May & June, I visited the homes of KIC Elders in Carnegie and Anadarko. I wanted to listen to their concerns and visited with them. I also shared my ideas for a Resolution Committee that the KIC is allowed to have and gathered their ideas of how to put it together. I appreciated the willingness of the elders to invite me into their homes and I enjoyed listening to their stories. All of them were encouraging to me.

During July, I was able to attend the breakfast and prayer service for the new Kiowa Chairman and Vice-Chairman. It was powerful to hear Kiowa hymns and the message brought forward by a Kiowa minister. Everyone prayed for the new Kiowa Chairman and Vice-Chairman, may Daw k'ee continue to guide them and direct them as they lead the Kiowa Tribe into a new and prosperous direction. After I traveled to Carnegie to witness them take their Oath of Office. It felt great to witness such an occasion and to be among those that traveled to be there in person.

I also attended the Kiowa Gourd Clan ceremony on the fourth of July. I was invited to camp with Davetta and Bobbie Geimausaddle. It was so much fun and I was happy to be there to help cook kidneys and sere all the guests and family that came to the camp. Even though it was hot!

In August, I had a meeting with both the Chairman and Vice-Chairman at the complex. I tried not to take too much of their time for I knew that they were busy and I appreciated their time to meet with me. I shared all the concerns that were brought to me from the KIC. I was very pleased that all the complaints and concerns were already brought to their attention and they were actively addressing the issues at the moment. It was a good informative, amicable meeting.

I then traveled to Elgin to meet with the new District 3 legislator, Tim Satepauhoodle, in his office. It was nice to hear his visions and concerns for his district. After this meeting I traveled to Lawton to meet with the new District 4 legislator, Alana Quetone, at her office. She has a lot of good ideas for her district as well. I asked both of these legislators the same three questions I asked the others. Their answers were the same, Communication in their district and the participation of their constituents are challenging.

Also, in August I was asked by the Chairman to become a committee member of the Kiowa, Comanche, and Apache (KCA) Intertribal Land Use Board. So, I traveled to Lawton and listen to the ways this board oversees the land owned by these three tribes. It is very interesting. In the future I plan to visit the cemeteries owned by the Kiowa Tribe since this board oversees their upkeep. This is a monthly meeting and I will continue to attend. Thank you, Chairman, for the invitation.

In September, I traveled to District 6 to share my idea for a Resolution Committee. I took items from the Kiowa Gift Shop for them to use for raffle. They were so happy to receive such donations. It was fun. During discussion at this meeting the idea was brought up to give the Resolution Committee a gift card to pay for gas. It was a good idea by Ben Wolf, I am currently working on it in the KIC budget. The whole Resolution Committee idea will be voted on by the KIC in the future. Currently it is an idea. More about that will come in the future. After this meeting, I traveled to Lawton to support District 4 at their meet and greet. It was a good visit.

I also met with Anthony Asetamy at the Tribal Courthouse. I heard the courtroom was under construction and I wanted to see what it looked like. Mr. Asetamy was happy to let me in to see the work that is being done. He first gave me some details about the work done. He had drawn out the design of the courtroom and one of the employees that work with him did the building. When I walked into the courtroom, it was beautiful. It already looked official and it's not completed yet. I was impressed with the work. He stated that the seats were going to be recovered with native print material and native paintings were going to be on the walls. He showed me around the rest of the courtroom building that will be used. It will have judge's chambers and offices, a room for visits for Child Welfare, and etc., there is a kitchen, a jury room, and bathrooms. They have worked on it tirelessly and it is really a beautiful work being done for our tribal court. I am thankful to Mr. Asetamy for his devotion to our tribal court system and all the work staff there had done to make our courtroom and facilitates ready when it opens.

Also, in September I traveled to Dallas to be at the district 7 meeting with newly elected District 7 Legislator, Warren Queton. It was a great turnout and

there was a good discussion about the concerns and needs of the Kiowa Citizens. They were very grateful to all of us who came down to visit them. Again, I took raffle items and the petition for the KIC who attended to sign if they wanted to. I don't always have to speak although I will introduce myself but my reason for being at different places is because I want to be with the KIC wherever they are and to listen and hear what they want and need to tell me.

In October I was at the district 7 meeting here in my home town Tulsa. I was happy to be invited by Mr. Queton. There was a good turnout and Mr. Queton was very informative about the meetings that he attended. Once again, I collected signatures for the petition. I had raffle items for the people there and it was a very good meeting.

On October 28th, I attended the Halloween Safe House at Red Buffalo Hall, the KIC had a stand. We had a call toss and gave our candy. There was a good turnout and it was so fun to see all the kids and people who showed up for the event. Thank you to Lily and Jamie for helping me with the game and passing out candy. My helpers were dressed as Dalmatians and I was a stick of dynamite! It was a good time! Thank you to everyone who came out!!

November 2, 2022, I met with Kiowa Elders in the home of Libby Hall. I wanted to share with them the idea of the Resolution Committee and we had four hours of discussion about our Tribe, what's new and the information I had ready. They were so kind and had lots of questions that I answered the best I could. They were fun, shared a lot with me and were encouraging to me. We had lunch together and I appreciated their ideas, questions, and encouragement.

This is a short list of the things I have been doing as KIC Coordinator, I will try to go to all the place I'm invited to and most people have been very nice and encouraging to me. I have enjoyed being invited to events, meetings, and the chance to get to know all of you. I appreciate your desire to stay informed and I will continue to let you know what I've been doing as KIC Coordinator.

Kiowa Tribe Sponsors Rock Your Mocs



The event began with the drum, songs led by Aaron Jones. The gym came to attention as the Kiowa Warrior Women lead the processional, followed by a parade of various Tribal flags to exhibit the different tribes the students represent. Special guests included Kiowa Tribal Chairman, Lawrence SpottedBird, Kiowa Vice-Chairman, Jacob Tsotigh, Apache Chairman, Durell Cooper III, and Kiowa District 2 Legislator, Michael Primus. The Kiowa Tribal Princess, Kyla Tsoodle, and Apache Tribal Princess, Peggy Maynahonah, were also present and participated in the demonstration of dances performed by the students of the Native American Heritage Club.

Professional MMA fighter and athlete, Manny “The Dragon” Muro, was selected as the keynote speaker this year. Muro is a Class of 2005 Carnegie graduate and was once a part of the Kiowa Summer Youth Program (SYSP). He captivated his audience by saying, “I am not here to impress you; but to inspire you, because you can be anyone you want to be if you put in the hard work.” Muro continued by sharing his personal testimony about his humble beginnings and the blessings of his success.



Phonic description: Gkoy-bay-goo ate mau-hay(n)-mau

The approximate translation is "We are learning Kiowa ways" or "We are learning the Kiowa way of doing things, thinking, and speaking". In the early phases of the program, it was decided that, when possible, we will use the Kiowa name for the program (as opposed to the English name). The elder mentors at that time decided that having language knowledge was not the only thing at stake. We were also learning about the "Kiowa way" of doing things and Kiowa thinking. It was decided that this title encompassed all of those ideas.



Position: **Treasurer**

Job Summary: The Treasurer oversees the financial affairs of the Kiowa Tribe and ensure the organization adheres to all legal accounting practices. To maintain and improve the company's financial standing by guiding financial policies, assessing risks, determining funding opportunities, and advising on investment opportunities.

Position: **Chief Financial Officer**

Job Summary: The Chief Financial Officer will direct and oversee the financial activities of the corporation, direct the preparation of current financial reports and summaries, and create forecasts predicting future growth.

Position: **Executive Director**

Job Summary: Under the direct supervision of the Kiowa Tribal Chairman, the Kiowa Executive Director is responsible for the overall day-to-day operations of the Kiowa Tribe in accordance with applicable policies, rules and regulations. Oversees the management and coordination of all tribal activities for the Kiowa Tribe including, but limited to, tribal and program budgets, cooperative agreements with all funding agencies, appropriate staff training and development, foster new financial opportunities and overall tribal growth.

Position: **Director of Human Resource**

Job Summary: The Human Resource Director will plan, direct, develop, and coordinate the policies, activities, and staff of the Human Resource (HR) Department, ensuring legal compliance and implementation of the Kiowa Tribe's mission and talent strategy.

Position: **Compliance Officer**

Job Summary: The Compliance Officer works with tribal programs and administration to ensure compliance with federal and tribal regulations or applicable funding guidelines and financial accountability. Identifies potential areas of compliance vulnerability and risk. Provides guidance on how to avoid potential situations in the future. Coordinates trainings for employees to ensure knowledge of legislative or regulatory issues and requirements, policies and procedures. Consults and coordinates Program Directors, and Finance regarding compliance processes and activities under the direct supervision of the Executive Director.

Position: **Law Enforcement Specialist**

Job Summary: The Incumbent will be responsible for supporting operations and administrative policies, procedures, systems, programs and areas such as acquisition, procurement, property and personnel management.

Position: **Information Technology (IT) Specialist**

Job Summary: The IT Specialist performs analytical, technical, and administrative work in the planning and installation of new and existing personal devices and workstations; diagnoses and resolves problems in the response to employee reported incidents; confers with employees to determine types of hardware and software required; installs new hardware and software and maintains existing components; trains end users in the use of equipment and software; troubleshoots and resolves issues with user devices and peripheral equipment located throughout organization; prepares progress reports for all worked performed; evaluates products for compatibility, expandability, and recommends to management the support or nonsupport of evaluated products.


Position: **Teacher's Aide**





Stephen read voraciously his entire life. His grade schoolteacher said, he often started with the phrase, "I read a book..." He had photographic memory and could

converse with anyone, on any topic with in-depth knowledge of the subject. He would include detailed facts AND he always had a backstory. Mrs. Dominguez, who was his childhood babysitter, had a thick Cuban accent. At age four, Steve could often be heard correcting her English pronunciation. His grandparents became friends with a Yakima family, and they nicknamed him "Yaka-Too-Much" for his constant talking. His father was a sportswriter for NY magazine. Steve was also a great writer. His dad served as his respected editor. Growing up in NY, the Smiths were lonesome for Indians back home. This is when they met the Thunderbird Dancers and established life-long friendships. This was around the time of the American Indian Movement (AIM). At that time, there was a conscious effort for Native people to be represented in a proper manner. Mifaunwe known as "Miffy," who was the daughter of Joe Shunatona (Otoe-Missouria Tribe) and from Oklahoma and who was in vaudeville. Miffy lived in NY and introduced Steve, Kevin and Judy Tarrant to the Sesame Street producers when they were looking for Native kids to be appear on the show. They were featured on November 23, 1970, in episodes 140 & 141. Steve also did some photographic modeling. The Deer/Smith's moved back to OKC in 1974 to care for his great-grandparents where he finished his high school education. The family then moved to Dallas in 1990. After moving to Dallas, Steve and his brother Christopher worked for Texas Rangers baseball and appeared on a few episodes of Walker, Texas Rangers. Steve worked for years in the hospitality business where he could engage in riveting conversations and make memorable moments with guests. Steve moved back to Oklahoma around 2005. He began attending tribal council meetings and later served as an elected representative of the Kiowa tribe's business committee, where he attended NCAI. He made friends across the country. He was voted in as the SW Area VP around 2010. He loved learning about federal policy and how it applied to many Tribes. He and his brother Chris worked together as professional videographers, where they walked inside the ropes with golfers at PGA & USGA major tournaments, worked the sidelines of NCAA & NFL football, and were ringside for World Championship Boxing, next to the dugout at Texas Ranger MLB games, and practically any other sporting event that is televised. Steve and Jewel's love story began as teenagers. Life took them on different paths but when they reunited it was like they never missed a beat. They spent the last ten years loving each other and living together in the Wichita Mountains area. He was blessed with the love of his companion and best friend in life. They lived in Meers, OK for 20 years where he treasured his roots. One of their great pleasures in life was living in the Wichita Mountains where they could observe the stars, serenity of the lake and the wildlife. In the last several months, Steve was overwhelmed with the caring nursing staff and the generosity of the Catholic ministries at Mercy hospital. He grew up in the Catholic faith and these recent outpourings of love and comfort, renewed his faith in a way he hadn't felt in many years. THE NATIONAL NATIVE AMERICAN VETERANS MEMORIAL

The Kiowa Tribe was well represented in Washington, DC, thanks to the enthusiasm of a few good men and women. The Kiowa Chairman, Kiowa Black Leggings Warrior Society, Kiowa Warrior Women's Color Guard, and other Kiowa Veterans, traveled to the National Native American Veterans Memorial.

The memorial first opened in 2020 on the grounds of the National Museum of the American Indian in Washington, DC. This past November 2022 it was dedicated with a procession and ceremony on the National Mall.

This was the first time that a multitude of Native heroes were recognized on such a grand scale. Every United States military branch was represented by all the Indigenous Tribes and Nations that graciously accepted the invitation.

It was especially important for the Kiowa Tribe to be represented well, one of the reasons Chairman SpottedBird extended the invitation to the Kiowa Black Leggings Warrior Society and others willing to make the trip by charter bus, provided by the Muscogee Nation. The Kiowa War Mothers Chapter 18 furnished sack lunches and snacks for the journey.

The group departed from Carnegie, Oklahoma, on November 7, 2022 and arrived in Memphis, Tennessee, later that evening. From Tennessee they traveled through Cherokee, NC, and Crystal City, VI, before arriving in Washington on November 10th.

The Kiowa Veterans wore their colors proudly and marched together in union behind the Kiowa and American flag. The moist weather and cool air tested their endurance, yet the procession was uninterrupted. The parade was a marvelous display of the warrior pride and strength that all Native American Veterans earn through their courage and bravery.

The Kiowa Veterans also took a moment to honor Pascal Poolaw, the Kiowa who served in the US Army during WWII, Korean War, and Vietnam War. He is the most decorated Native American with 42 medals and citations, including four Silver Stars, five Bronze stars, and three Purple Hearts for each war. It was a noble gesture for the Kiowa Veterans to recognize the bravery and service of Pascal Poolaw through song.

The Kiowa Veterans made their way home after the events, arriving safely in Carnegie on November 14. Each participant returning to their loved ones with special memories and an experience of lifetime.

L.E.A.D.: Live well, Eat well, & be Active with Diabetes



Live well, Eat well, and be Active with Diabetes (L.E.A.D.) is an active training program designed to help people manage their diabetes and promote healthy lifestyles. The L.E.A.D. program was brought forward through the partnership of the Kiowa Community Health Representatives (CHR) & the Oklahoma State University (OSU) Extension as part of the Special Diabetes Program for Indians (SDPI).


Participant Jeffrey Bear said that he felt like the program was beneficial. He especially remembers the Live well aspect because it introduced the plate method. The idea behind the plate method is to divide a nine-inch plate into three sections to balance the intake of carbohydrates and sugar; 1/4 for protein, 1/4 for starch, fruit or dairy, and at least 1/2 for non-starchy vegetables.

Statistics reveal that the fight against diabetes in the United States has grown intense over the past few years. The rate of people diagnosed with diabetes has increased at an alarming rate; in 2019, 37.3 million Americans (11.3% of population) had tested for diabetes, this includes about 244,000 children & adolescents that were diagnosed with Type 1. Native Americans, or Indigenous communities, are especially affected with this illness.

The Eat well module is designed to incorporate healthier substitutes in otherwise the traditional unhealthy foods that we people usually consume. Implementing healthier options into cooking is a beneficial tool because it reduces the amount of carbohydrates and sugar. The being Active with Diabetes is a resource of helpful tips on how an increase of physical activity can reduce the chances of nerve damage. The program accentuates how moderate exercise, like casual walks and household chores, can make a difference. Monteith advises to speak to a physician and to start slow with moderate activity and gradually increase to other physical activities such as dancing, bicycling, and running.

Megan Monteith, OSU's Family & Consumer Sciences, explained that the four-week course provides tools and resources as well as hope for individuals dealing with Type 2 diabetes in the state of Oklahoma. The program focuses on four researched modules, the aspects of living well, eating well, and being active. The four-week course trained heavily on meal planning and strategies for modifying recipes.

The Kiowa CHR stated that plans for another course are underway and will be announced soon.
